# HONOLULU FESTIVAL WELCOMES THE PUBLIC TO ENJOY PACIFIC RIM CULTURAL CELEBRATION, MARCH 8-10

# Highlight Events Include Free Cultural Performances at Three Locations, Grand Parade and Nagaoka Fireworks Show in Waikiki, and New Japan Food Festival

**HONOLULU – February 29, 2024 –** The 28th Annual Honolulu Festival, Hawaii's premier celebration of Pacific Rim culture and arts, returns for a weekend filled with exciting activities, cultural music and dance performances, special events, and educational experiences for the public to enjoy March 8-10.

Highlighted among the Honolulu Festival's variety of events and activities are the free cultural performances and exhibits at the Hawai'i Convention Center, Ala Moana Center, and Waikiki Beach Walk on March 9 and 10, and the magnificent Grand Parade through Waikiki followed by the spectacular Nagaoka Fireworks Show over Waikiki Beach to conclude the festival on March 10.

Presented by the Honolulu Festival Foundation under the banner of **Pacific Harmony**, this year's theme is, *Walk Together with Aloha, Pass the Baton to a Sustainable and Peaceful Future*.

Honolulu Festival Foundation President Ted Kubo noted the significance of the theme and the importance to Hawaii of celebrating culture by bringing people together from around the world. "The Honolulu Festival is founded on the belief that the exchange of global ideas through the activities of the festival can lead to a better understanding of the world and contribute to a better and sustainable future of Hawaii for generations to come," said Kubo.

The Honolulu Festival begins Friday, March 8, with two private events at the Hawai'i Convention Center focused on educational and cultural enrichment. In the morning, Educational School Tours, a free, interactive cultural experience will be provided to more than 400 Hawaii school students. That evening, the Friendship Gala, a fundraiser featuring cultural entertainment and delicious foods will take place to benefit the Honolulu Festival Foundation's educational and cultural exchange programs.

The Honolulu Festival is open to the public on Saturday, March 9, and Sunday, March 10, featuring free performances by cultural groups from Japan, the Pacific Rim, and Hawaii at three locations, the Hawai'i Convention Center, Ala Moana Center, and Waikiki Beach Walk.

Kubo added, "The festival provides groups from around the Pacific Rim with a wonderful opportunity to showcase their culture, traditions, arts, and people through free public performances. At the same time, Hawaii community groups and residents interact and connect with people from around the Pacific Rim to build a greater respect and understanding."

The Hawai'i Convention Center will also host a craft fair and exhibits, the Honolulu Art Market, a Japanese Film Festival, and the Ennichi Corner, featuring hands-on cultural activities and games for children to enjoy. For adults 21 years of age and older, the popular Sake and Food Fest exhibit returns for the second straight year, providing samplings of sake, shochu, and awamori to enjoy.
